Good afternoon Honorable Members of the Committee on Insurance and Real Estate. My name is Loretta Jay and I live in Fairfield. I thank you for this opportunity to provide comment regarding *An Act Concerning Community-Based Health Services*.

I support the proposed Act to require the Insurance Commissioner to explore incentive-based systems to expand community-based services for children with developmental disabilities. I further encourage the expansion of the said Act to also include children with behavioral health needs. I come to this opinion through various professional and life experiences. I run a consulting organization that promotes the emotional health of children and I manage special projects that impact children with mental health disorders. I am a former DCF social worker, supervisor and consultant in the Department's Community Services. Consequently I have seen first hand both the direct and indirect value of community based services for children. Finally, I am the parent of a child with behavioral health needs.

As we all know, Connecticut must lower its expenditures. It may seem counterintuitive to expand services during such a time. But expanding community-based services for children with developmental and behavioral health needs has proven to be cost-effective. Appealing to insurance companies with an incentive-based system will improve the quality of care provided to Connecticut's high-risk children and save the state money by providing lower-cost intervention at the community level. This intervention, when implemented timely and effectively, prevents unnecessary hospitalization and residential placement.

I respectfully urge you to support the Act Concerning Community-Based Health Services, and to expand the proposed act to also include children with behavioral health needs. The outlay at the onset will yield cost savings in the long run.
